TEENS OF THE 275 PODCAST AIMS TO FOSTER FUTURE STARS OF THE MEDIA

A new podcast is giving Mangere students a chance to grill some of the Pacific's leading media personalities.

Teen of the 275 is a podcast aiming to inspire young people to take on new opportunities by giving students the chance to interview those who have managed to break down stereotypes and succeed where others haven't.

The podcast is produced by PMN News in partnership 275 Times and in the first two episodes Māngere College's Kasey Wehi, Tulei Salu and Manuia Fox-Romia hosted two amazing guests who have excelled in journalism and fashion, Mariner Fagaiava-Muller and Ernestina Bonsu-Maro.

In the first episode, the students spoke

with Fagaiava-Muller about his journey from a shy kid at De La Salle College in Māngere East to becoming one of NZ's most well-known Pacific media personalities. Fagaiava-Muller also speaks about what he sees as the biggest challenges facing his community and how we need to see more Pacific youth getting into the world of journalism.

In the second episode, the students interviewed Bonsu-Maro, who is a former



Miss Cook Islands NZ and radio host, about how she went from being a carefree Māngere College student to starting her own modelling agency and hosting a show on 531pi.

For the debutant hosts, the experience of interviewing guests on a podcast has made

an immediate impact. Year 12 student Tulei Salu says it's already one of the most "memorable moments" of her life. "It has helped me in so many ways possible, from enhancing my confidence skills to making new connections," she says. Kasey Wehi, who's in his last

year at college says interviewing successful Māngere residents was particularly inspiring.



"I learnt that regardless of your upbringing, you are able to thrive in 'white spaces' and you can succeed in any career of your choosing."

The youngest of the hosts, year 11 student Manuia Fox-Romia, says she was initially quite nervous about hosting a podcast, but the PMN staff and her fellow hosts "made me feel super comfortable and supported". And she hopes others are inspired.

"I hope that young people especially the ones in Mangere see themselves in these successful role models."

COMMUNITY RALLIES BEHIND FAMILIES DEVASTATED BY MASSIVE FIRE



Much needed donations of money and clothes have been flowing in for families affected by the massive fire in Mängere Bridge.

"Nothing was left." That's how Frank Koloi

summarised the devastating scenes next to his church, following a fire that destroyed four homes in the early hours of November 30 in Mangere Bridge.

Koloi, who's acting as



spokesperson for the Siasi Tokaikolo 'ia Kalaisi Tongan church, says the survivors have literally been left with the clothes on their backs. But he says both the congregation and the wider community have been quick to offer support to the 18 affected people who were living in the destroyed cabins.

"They were just in singlets and pyjamas when they got out, so one of the first things members brought was blankets," he told 275 Times.

"And one of the first people

who came was the principal of Mangere Bridge Primary to offer their support - and to make sure our children have what they needed so they won't have to miss out on the school's end of year celebrations."

Koloi, who's a trustee with the church, says around 14 fire trucks attended the fire. The church was originally built around 1996, and Koloi says the church has long been a place of refuge: "It's become iconic for the Tonga community.'
