

MEET THE CANDIDATES:

SCHOOL STUDENTS DEMAND ANSWERS AT LOCAL ELECTION FORUM

Housing, youth spaces, accountability and Māori representation were front and centre as young people questioned candidates ahead of the local council elections.

High school students were given the microphone to ask the hard questions of local body candidates at a recent Meet the Candidates event in the Mangere Town Centre.

Manuia Fox-Romia, head girl for Māngere College, challenged candidates on the disconnect between council and communities.

"What will you do to ensure accountability and bridge that gap and ensure people on the ground have a say and are informed of the decisions that affect them the most?" she asked.

While her schoolmate, Safa Mustafa, stressed accessibility. "Events like this should be accessible to everyone, not only through social media but in places where everyone else are also involved."

CANDIDATE RESPONSES

Incumbent Manukau ward councillor Lotu Fuli said underserved communities needed strong advocates.

"Our communities remain underserved, and so we need really strong voices at that decision-making table.

"People like Alf [Filipaina] and myself ... will not back down when

we are faced with huge pressure from multi-millionaires sitting around that table."

First-time candidate Vicky Hau and manager of the Mangere Town Centre, said youth spaces were urgent.

"We do not have a youth hub ... that is one of the initiatives that I would like to roll out and ideally for it to sit here somewhere in our town centre."

Others focused on jobs and leadership, and calls for greater employment and career pathways for rangatahi.

Local business owner Swanie Nelson highlighted Māori representation was missing.

"It's crazy to me that we don't have a Māori representative currently on our local board ... The first thing you can do is vote Māori back into these positions ... what's good for Māori is good for all."

COMMUNITY-LED FOCUS

The event, held on Saturday, September 6, was co-organised by 275 Times managing editor Jo Latif, who said the goal was to make politics accessible.

"We have a really low voter turnout for Māngere historically. The point of today's event was to show people who is standing. So when the papers arrive in their letterbox, they'll be like, 'oh, I know these people, I've seen them talk'."

Latif said including students was deliberate.

"It's important for young people because they are our future leaders. They are the ones facing the decisions of today's leaders ... they are going to be growing up in this community with their families and living the reality. So what better people to speak up and have a say now."

Community voices rang out at the **Nga Tapuwae Community Centre** this month as long-time activist, musician and former 275 Times editor, Roger Fowler launched his new vinyl album, Songs of Struggle & Solidarity.

The project was sparked when young people attending Palestine rallies encouraged Fowler to record his well-known protest songs. "They thought they should be recorded," he said. "So we pulled together a session."

True to his grassroots approach, the album was recorded in just one day at Revolver Studios, with each track laid down in a single take.

Roger chose vinyl for nostagic

reasons.

"I'm old school," Fowler laughed. "But hey, vinyl is making a comeback!" Produced in collaboration with Banana Boat Records, the LP carries the energy of live performance and community spirit.

The launch night drew a full house of whānau, friends, and fellow campaigners. Highlights included a rousing mass singalong and an emotional moment when Fowler was honoured with an appreciation award from leaders of the local Palestinian community.

"It was an amazing turnout," he said.

For Fowler, the album is not just music but a call to action. He remains committed to writing and singing

in support of the Free Palestine movement.

"It's about building awareness and support for justice," he said.

The LP is being distributed on a koha basis, with supporters invited to contribute to his account (RN FOWLER, ASB 12-3055-0179291-00). Fowler also encourages people to connect with the global movement for Palestine through the Kia Ora Gaza website and Facebook, and to join weekly rallies each Saturday.

Special thanks, he added, goes to his whānau, Revolver Studios, and Banana Boat Records for their backing in bringing the project to life.

WHY EVERY FAMILY NEEDS A WILL

MĀNGERE BRIDGE LAWYER SHARES CRUCIAL ADVICE

For many families, the subject of writing a will can feel uncomfortable, but Mängere Bridge lawyer Mataiasi Toófohe says it's one of the most important steps people can take to protect their loved ones.

Toófohe, who works at Mason and Mortimer's Lawyers in Mangere Bridge, says too many families leave things until it's too late. "A lot of people put it off because they don't want to think about death," he explains. "But not having a will creates more stress, more cost, and more conflict for your family."

He notes that when someone dies without a will, their estate must go through the courts, which can take months – especially if there are multiple children or generations involved. "You've got all these different personalities, different views, and sometimes greed comes into it," he says. "A will removes that uncertainty. It's a simple document that makes sure your wishes are followed."

Drawing from his experience with local families, Toófohe says having a will isn't just for the elderly or wealthy. "If you own a house, have more than \$40,000 in savings, or any kind of insurance, you should have a will," he stresses. "Even young people with assets need one."

He adds that setting up a will is quick and affordable – often completed within a week. "It's actually cheaper to do it with a lawyer than to leave your family to fight it out in court," he says. "And remember, a will isn't permanent. You can change it as your circumstances change."

Proudly Tongan and from Mangere, Toófohe also wants Pacific families to feel comfortable seeking advice. "I enjoy working with our community because Lunderstand the cultural values. At the end of the day, a will isn't about death - it's about love and protecting your family."

Winning the Lotto NRFL Championship and securing promotion back into the Northern League isn't just a victory for Manukau United's mens team, but a statement that South Auckland football is on the rise, according to the team's head coach Gordon Paulsen.

"This means a lot for our club and our community," Paulsen says.
"We'll now be the only South
Auckland team competing at this level. It's a fantastic achievement and something everyone involved can be proud of."

The promotion marks a return for Manukau United, who were relegated two seasons ago.

Last year they narrowly missed out, losing in a playoff on penalties. This season, however, they pushed through, overcoming an early stumble to go on a strong winning run.

Paulsen credits the team's success to culture and unity.

"We've built an inclusive culture where players love the club and know what it means. Some of our squad have played professionally, others are still developing, but they've all bought into a common goal," he says.

"United we stand, together we achieve – that's our motto."

Depth also played a key role. "Last season we didn't quite have it, but this year we did. Even when players were out, our performances stayed consistent," Paulsen explains.

For the coach, community support has been vital. Fans followed the team across Auckland and beyond, and young local players have been inspired by the journey. "We can't do what we do without our community," Paulsen says.

"We encourage more kids in South Auckland to take up football. Sport teaches life lessons you don't always get elsewhere – teamwork, resilience, positivity."

United prepares for the challenges of the Northern League, Paulsen is confident. "We've changed the narrative. The club is stronger, the culture is right, and with our community behind us, we'll keep building."

FROM SIDE HUSTLE TO ICONIC EATS:

BANH MI BOY PUTS MÄNGERE ON AUCKLAND'S FOODIE MAP

What started as a side hustle on Massey Road has become one of Auckland's most celebrated food stories. Banh Mi Boy, founded by husbandand-wife team John and Zeena Giang, has now been recognised three years running in Auckland's Iconic Eats 100 list – proof that their authentic Vietnamese sandwiches have struck a chord well beyond Mängere.

For John, the inspiration came years earlier. Having lived in California and Australia, he was struck by how entire takeaway shops were dedicated to banh mi. A 2016 trip to Vietnam sealed the idea. "Banh mi is a staple in Vietnam – you can get it nearly every corner you turn," he recalls. Back in Auckland, while juggling a career in real estate, John and Zeena began recipe testing and in 2022 took the

plunge with a food truck.

Māngere was always the natural home for the business. John's parents once ran a bakery there, and he spent his childhood at the local markets. Zeena also has strong family connections to the area. "We felt right at home here," says John.

Their dedication quickly paid off. The traditional banh mi – stacked with Vietnamese ham, BBQ pork, and pork brawn – won Iconic Eats accolades in their first two years. The third award went to Zeena's favourite, the fragrant lemongrass chicken banh mi. At first, John thought the award notification was spam. "The second

time I thought it was a fluke. The third time I knew all our hard work was paying off."

For the couple, the recognition is about more than awards. "My goal is to put the spotlight on this staple food item," John explains. "In New Zealand, banh mi is often hidden in menus as just a light snack. We want to give it the recognition it deserves – and be the place people think of when they crave it."


The transition from food truck to their store on Montgomerie Road was "much needed," John says. "The truck was just to test our product.
Amazingly, it worked out exactly how I envisioned."

Community has been central throughout. "The 275 community backed us from day one," John says. "Even now, our food truck regulars still come to the shop. Without their love and support, we wouldn't be here. Our BMB family keeps growing – and we're truly grateful."

She is the only member of the squad of Maori (Te Rarawa) and Samoan (Village of Vaiusu) descent, carrying her family connections proudly with her on this great journey

Recognised for her leadership both on and off the range, Jaeda was nominated by her peers and voted into the role of team captain, alongside fellow captain Logan Dittert of Manawatu. She also helped design the new team shirt and, together with her koro, wrote the team's karakia in te reo Māori.

The 37-strong squad will take on their Australian counterparts in the Trans-Tasman Challenge from September 25 to 30, a test that will demand focus, skill and teamwork.

For Jaeda, the honour is as much about service as it is achievement.

"I am immensely proud to have earned my spot on the team and to wear the fern, particularly as archery begins to increase in popularity and diversity in Aotearoa," she says. "I see the captain's role as a position of service to the team and look forward to supporting the younger archers on their journey of NZ representation."

She draws strength from the whakataukī: "Ehara taku toa i te toa takitahi, engari he toa takitini" — success is not the work of an individual, but the work of many.

Looking ahead to the week of competition, Jaeda says: "We must work together to be successful against the Australian team. I look forward to bonding, shooting and making life-long memories."

Three Southern Cross alumni, Christian Faimalo, Petelo Saia and Freddy To'ofohe, returned to help backstage. To'ofohe, now studying performing arts, reflected: "I loved coming back and helping. Thank you for letting me help backstage, it was so good to experience the showcase from a different side and learn new things. I'll be back for the next one!"

Students also shared their pride in performing.

"The showcase was the highlight of

my life so far, I can't wait to do it again next year," said Taivero Isamaela. Fellow performer Illzmay Kimi-Piiti added, "The showcase shows us that someone believes in us.

"We proved to ourselves that we really could perform to our fullest potential."

The showcase capped off a stellar year for Southern Cross Performing Arts, which also celebrated success in the national Play It Strange competitions and Elev8's win in the New Found Sound competition (pictured below).

PRESERVING VOICES OF MIGRATION, MEMORY AND COMMUNITY

A powerful new exhibition and film project, The Landing, is now on show at the Mangere Arts Centre, celebrating the voices and stories of seniors from Mangere and Ōtāhuhu. The project combines a documentary film with a photography exhibition, weaving together deeply personal accounts of migration, settlement, and community pride.

Directed by husband-and-wife team Sith Douanga Kham Chanh and Lillian Rose Martirez, The Landing is their first long-form documentary. Both are proud to be from Mangere and say the project gave them an exciting opportunity to work creatively in their own community. "Normally we work in commercial content, but this time it was ours. No one was telling us what to do," says Martirez. "It was our creative freedom."

The film captures intimate interviews with local elders, recorded in their homes. While initially nervous, the directors said the participants quickly opened up. "Hearing everyone's story was heartwarming. They welcomed us and made us feel at home," says Kham Chanh. Diversity was central to the project: "We wanted to make sure we captured different ethnic groups. Everyone's experience is different, but also parallel."

The project was led by Auckland Council's Gillianne Ray, who serves the Mangere-Ōtahuhu Local Board. With a background in community planning, Ray saw the need to record these histories before they were lost. "I realised our seniors will pass on – have we actually captured their stories?" she says. "This is part of our heritage. It's about future-proofing for generations to come."

Ray worked to secure funding, coordinate the moving parts, and set the brief: the stories had to feature ordinary people, not politicians or public figures. For her, the project is also about changing perceptions. "Too often South Auckland is painted negatively. We wanted a proud story, one that shows the good in this place."

The title, The Landing, reflects both the journeys of those who settled in Mangere and Ōtāhuhu, and the presence of Auckland Airport nearby. "It's about how people arrived and why they chose to stay," Ray explains.

Together, the film and exhibition stand as a tribute to

resilience, belonging, and community pride – a reminder that Mangere's stories are worth archiving, celebrating, and passing on.

ENROLMENTS FOR 2026



Enrolment at the school is governed by an Enrolment Scheme, which is available from the school office or website. The deadline for applications for out-of-zone places is 3pm, Wednesday 8th October 2025.

The Board has determined that there will be approximately the following places available for out-of-zone students next year:

Te Poho o Rāwhiti (Māori): Years 1 = 17 spaces, Year 2-4 - 10 spaces, Y5&6 - 3 spaces O Lou Ala i Mālō (Samoan): Year 1 = 7 spaces, Y2-4 - 7 spaces, Y5&8 - 0 spaces Kafa Taha (Tongan): Year 1 = 5 spaces, Year 2-6 - 0 spaces Cook Islands Māori: Year 1 = 8 spaces, Years 3-6 - 8 spaces Kahu (English-Medium): Years 7-8 = 0 spaces English-Medium: Years 1-6 = 0 spaces

The exact number of places will depend on the number of applications received from students who live within the school's home zone. If the number of out-of-zone applications exceeds the number of places available, students will be selected by ballot. If a ballot is required it will be held on Wednesday 15th October 2025. Parents will be informed of the outcome of the ballot within three school days of the ballot being held.


