AMPLIFYING THE VOICES OF MANGERE



Putting the voices of Mangere at the heart of its regeneration is the motivation behind a new initiative being launched by the Mangere Housing Advocacy Group.

The group, which was formed in 2019 by Māngere electorate MP Aupito Su'a William Sio to ensure Kāinga Ora was consulting with residents as part of its Māngere Development, will be publishing a series of stories, from interviews with local leaders and residents in our area.

Monica Liva, a longtime Māngere resident and one of the group's members says the stories will highlight the community's housing aspirations and how Māngere's long term development plans can prioritise locals needs. "We need access to home accountable and make sure the community is a priority for all housing strategic initiatives.

One of the founding members of the Advocacy Group and member of the

and living environments that are designed with our people's needs in mind and that starts by putting their perspectives at the centre of any new urban regeneration." She says these stories will also enable the group to hold housing authorities

Māngere-Ōtāhuhu Local Board, Harry Fatu Toleafoa, stresses the importance of addressing systemic issues, stating: "Our focus extends beyond immediate solutions. "We aim to challenge discriminatory housing practices and advocate for policy and engagement changes that will benefit future generations." Māngere Housing Advocacy Group leader Jo Latif says the purpose of the group has always been to make a lasting impact on the lives of the community,

"Through addressing the area's immediate housing challenges, we can bring about long-term systemic changes by ensuring the voices of Māngere residents are heard, and their housing rights are protected – and that's what this project is all about."

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NEW HOUSING WELCOMED, BUT QUESTIONS REMAIN

Local leaders, high school students and construction workers gathered to mark the opening of Kāinga Ora's (KO) newest block of apartments on Bader Drive.

According to KO's General Manager for Innovation and Construction Patrick Dougherty, the houses are the first KO has built that can regulate their own temperature.

The 18 two- and three-bedroom apartments are part of a three level block opposite Māngere College, with each home designed to only cost tenants \$1 a day to heat or cool. "They'll offer a reduced operational carbon footprint of around 35 per cent and reduced space heating electricity use by 62 per cent, compared to a standard 6 Homestar Kāinga

Ora home," Dougherty said.

He added that another benefit of this project is that it will improve local infrastructure to reduce the impact of future floods. However questions remain for some locals about the lack of larger houses for Pacific families. Long-time community advocate Peter Sykes hopes KO will invest more into improving business and community services as part of its regeneration of the area. "I agree that we need housing, but it needs to be housing that's fit for purpose," he says. "It should be universal, it should warm and dry but it should also recognise the context where you are - so don't build on flood plains."

Mängere College student Tulei Salu is less

critical but echoes Sykes' comments.

"[These houses] are ideal for small families and those couples just starting out," Salu says.

"But for Pacific families it's important to have bigger houses or bigger spaces or at least have a garage or green spaces, for people to hang out with their families." Käinga Ora board chair Vui Mark Gosche also attended the opening, and while

also attended the opening, and while acknowledging the size of the houses is an ongoing matter to be considered, he believes the community will appreciate the addition of these high quality homes to the area.

"I think Māngere people welcome the idea of better, newer, drier, healthier houses like this, because the existing housing stock is well past it's used by date and as we show people this quality of build, it makes it even easier to do this sort of thing more."

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DISNEY HIRES MANGERE ARTIST

After eight months of storyboarding scenes for a Disney+ series, the project wrapped up but the Disney team wanted to keep him on board. "My job as Cultural Consultant is to look over anything that involves Polynesian and Sāmoan cultural aspects, things like Moana and Lilo & Stitch visual depictions on screen or even merchandise and designs." SPONSOR MÅNGERE COLLEGE STUDENTS' TRIP TO JAPAN


